

PCE Credit Statement

Pharmacy Continuing Education (PCE) credit will be earned based on full participation in the individual programs. Attendance and participation in a session are required before obtaining PCE credit. Any individual who is more than 10 minutes late and/or leaves early will not be granted PCE credit. Participants must complete a program evaluation form and posttest for each program to receive PCE credit. This procedure will be strictly enforced, so please plan accordingly.
